Six speakers have been engaged; broad spectrum of professions; time built in for Q&A. Audience is Grade 8's.

Update on Construction			
<ul> <li>Timeline and schedule were e-mailed by Administration to all parents.</li> </ul>			
• It has been agreed that drilling will not take place during school hours; windows have been removed and boarded with plywood. The contractor is working from the exterior. Ministry of Labour visited during March Break. Administration has the report (is public knowledge) and it is available to parents to review. The contractor stopped work for one day as workers were not wearing hard hats, notices weren't posted, and guardrails were needed. The Ministry of Labour came back last week. Ministry didn't site air quality concerns. It has been agreed that the workers will use a HEPA vacuum when drilling. As well, the HVAC will be turned off when drilling and then turned back on when complete. The third-party inspector did not have any concerns and felt that compliance was met. Administration has copy of this report in the office.			
Anti-Bullying Control of the Control			
• The Anti-Bullying Prevention Plan (Policy) has been updated. It is considered a working document. Administration has observed the school playground, unstructured time (recess) and situations where teachers may not directly observe student behaviour. It was noted that Administration aims to support students in understanding and preventing bullying and how to react. The goal is for students to feel valued and safe from Kindergarten through Grade 8. Expectations are outlined by age/grade. The Policy clarifies the definition of bullying and covers physical, verbal, social and cyber bullying, as well as anti-bullying strategies.			
<ul> <li>Runnymede embraces opportunities to educate students. For example, November is anti-bullying month; announcements are made over the PA; address at assemblies; pink shirt day is regarded; books are available in Runnymede's library. The Policy will continue to be tweaked and published on the website.</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>Runnymede abides by progressive discipline. Administration is in constant communication with parents. Incidents are tracked in the office among Administration only. Parties involved will know about a situation and it is not shared more broadly. Strategies for mitigation are discussed. Working on situations restoratively.</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>A parent asked how empathy is taught in the classroom. Through read aloud's and character education. Honesty is the emphasis for March. Cooperation is the focus in April. These characters are injected into classroom communications and discussed regularly in primary grades. Reciprocal respect is addressed with senior grades. Social workers are leveraged in the school to help with 1:1 support.</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>Administration is seeing a decrease in incidents, likely due to restorative actions. Certain children need more support. Professionals are engaged to support families as well. Education is being shared in school communications and via Parent Council. Education at home and in the school is important. TDSB monitors on-line security infractions (Administration is made aware). It was mentioned that there are very few on-line infractions at Runnymede. Teachers monitor in classrooms. Parents can pay TDSB if parents want chrome books monitored at home.</li> </ul>			
<ul> <li>A parent asked how inclusiveness is incorporated into the curriculum. If parents are seeing concerns, they should bring to the attention of Administration. Administration monitors outside at recess and lunch to ensure situations don't escalate. Students also voice their concerns directly to the office. Explanations are provided to students directly so they</li> </ul>			

	understand inclusiveness. If a parent is a witness to a situation, parents are encouraged to raise with Administration.			
•	SAC has issued a consultation on social emotional learning and bullying prevention and intervention plan. There are 10 multiple choice questions and the consultation period ends on March 31. Parents are encouraged to add any specific concerns for the sub-committee to consider.			
•	Paper copies of Runnymede's Anti-Bullying Prevention Plan were provided to parents at the SAC meeting.

•	Mary Beth Kyer noted the Ward's focus on the strategic direction of belonging, achieving, thriving and revitalization.			
•	Complaints incident handling training is being provided.			
•	Reviewing student accommodations; analysis of courses available.			
•	Business continuity planning and cyber security- new initiatives are underway. Whistleblower program revitalization underway.			
•	There is a spreadsheet available showing all initiatives underway. 24 school audits are in progress.

	PIAC Update:			
•	PIAC (Parent Involvement Advisory Committee) is a Board Advisory Committee to the TDSB. All wards are supported and a Trustee sits on the Committee. Facilitates and coalesces parents' voices and concerns. Emily Abrahams is the Ward 7 Representative for PIAC. Some initiatives discussed: auditing of lunch providers (not for Runnymede). There are concerns with certain Board approved vendors. There will be a vote at the next Board meeting to determine if schools will be required to devote fundraising dollars (1%) to schools in need. Most representatives seem to be against this proposal. Trustee vote is TBD. Looking at how elections are facilitated across each Ward. Parents are encouraged to reach out to Emily Abrahams with any questions or topics for PIAC. Great resources are available via PIAC.			

	Student Parliament Update			
•	Eloise, Prime Minister, Ava, Minister of Entertainment and Blythe, Minister of Grade 6 Matters attended the meeting. They spoke about the Spring dance held in March. An Easter/ Spring food drive is underway with Sharing Place for two weeks. Collections start next week. The Sharing Place has requested food to be provided in reusable shopping bags. Pajama Day is on March 28 (theme day). Poster for anti-bullying week is being created. Making a paper chain of nice messages in the shape of a heart. Candy-grams were a success in February and raised \$350- half of the funds were donated to the Grade 8 graduation trip and half to the Sharing Place.			
•	The parent community congratulated the students on their accomplishments.			
	Teacher Update			
•	Mark Latter noted that the Spring arts night will be held on June 5 with a Grade 3 and 4 concert (choir and band performance) starting at 4:00. Runnymede jazz band will be performing. Art will be coordinated throughout the school. The event is funded through parent donations. Grades 6-8 contemporary art will be displayed. Parent volunteers will be needed for June 5.			
•	An update from the library was provided. The Forest of Reading Book Club will encourage students to vote for their favourite book and author, in April. As well, there is a book reading on Saturday March 30 in the Junction, profiling an Ontario, francophone author.			
•	Madame Enrico's class participated in "Socks for Soles" and collected and donated over 1000 socks.

•	Approximately \$25,000 remains in the legacy account. This includes carry forward from 2023-24 plus a family foundation donated \$15,000 for instruments and a teacher donated \$2,000. This will be used for the Teacher Resource Fund (TRF) and Green Teacher.

•	Gym construction- overview of observations, concerns, communications			E. Meana S. Tesfai
•	Thanks were extended to Administration and caretaking staff for their transparent dialogue and partnership to ensure the safety of our children.			R. Lockhart
•	Following the last SAC meeting, parents were under the impression that construction wouldn't happen during school hours. It was mentioned that on February 18, parents were made aware that dust, noise and toxic fumes have been experienced during school hours. Children were providing updates to parents, as were teachers. Erin Meana walked through the building with Rosanna Sardella and communicated many			

questions to TDSB (per TDSB's request). There were further questions and concerns based on the response from TDSB. A meeting with all parties and an invitation to attend our council meeting was requested but TDSB declined all requests. The Ministry of Labour was called by parents. They inspected the Runnymede site. Signs have been posted, last week noting asbestos and lead exposure, and this week a new sign noting silica (it was noted by parents that these are considered Level 1 carcinogens). Some classes received an email about exposure without details or level of severity (as this information was not provided by the TDSB). This notification was based on exposure from one day.

- The parent community asked Administration why classes are continuing in the gym? Administration has been told by the TDSB that our gym is safe. The Contractor did not tell the sub-contractor that they couldn't drill during class hours; however other than one day recently (March 20), Administration has not seen drilling during the day. Administration has contacted the Health & Safety representative who assists in providing information.
- Administration will speak with gym teachers about the possible closure of the large gym. There will need to be a plan to keep children active (which will become easier with warmer weather).
- It was noted by the parent community that while only two classes have potentially had direct exposure, the entire school has potentially had exposure as well. It was noted that the HVAC is not being cleaned after work is done and there could be exposure every time there is drilling. The HEPA vacuum and turning the HVAC on/off should assist with reducing exposure, but the system would need to be cleaned and then sealed off from the rest of the school. The parent community noted that a request was made for a safety plan in the Fall. We still have not received a plan or any details from TDSB. Parents noted that we need to self-advocate for our children as it appears regulations specific to our children are not transparent or thorough.
- It was noted that Debbie King (Trustee) and Maia Puccetti have been copied on all parent communications to Superintendent John Currie.
- It was noted that the rest of the building needs a new roof, and this work is expected to start in the Fall.

Next Steps following discussion at the SAC meeting include:

- Parents at the SAC meeting encouraged Administration to close the gym for the remainder of the construction work to keep students and teachers safe. Administration will confirm their decision once discussed with teachers (a plan for physical activity elsewhere would be needed).
- 2. Administration will revisit the request for air quality testing (no response received to-date), despite the TDSB protocol of air quality not being tested during the construction period.
- Administration will confirm the cleaning protocol for the HVAC. The
  parent community has asked that the entire HVAC system be cleaned
  and once cleaned, any portions within work areas should be sealed
  off from the system while work is ongoing.
- 4. Parents have asked for communication about the days drilling occurred while children were inside and what substances they may have been exposed to over the past few months while work was taking place during school hours.
- 5. Parents continue to request a safety plan showing the appropriate

approvals. Parents are asking for weekly updates regarding construction progress and assurance that safety protocols are being followed. Any breaches should be communicated immediately to parents.

Timing of next water test for lead levels			
<ul> <li>Parents noted that there was a recent publication noting lead being detected in multiple Toronto schools (not Runnymede). Administration confirmed that our water is flushed every morning at 6:30am and is logged by head caretaker. The test for lead at Runnymede will take place at some point this year.</li> </ul>			
The data breach that occurred in December 2024 with "PowerSchool" was raised. It was mentioned that a generic response was provided to potentially impacted parties. Complimentary identity protection services are being offered for students, parents/guardians, and educators across Canada.

<ul> <li>Projectors, headphones for EQAO testing, dongles, speakers, extension cords, kindergarten needs for curriculum (magnets, sink/float, microscopes), intermediate consumables (oil, tin foil, batteries) have been provided.
